Though conscious of the difficulty of learning without a teacher, I set but with high hope, and a fixed purpose, at whatever cost of trouble, to learn how to read. The very decided manner with which he spoke, and strove to impress his wife with the evil consequences of giving me instruction, served to convince me that he wa deeply sensible of the truths he was uttering. It gave me the best Issurance that I might rely with the utmost confidence on the results which, he said, would flow from leaching me to read. That he most dreaded, that I most desired. What he most loved, that I most hated. That which to him was a great evil, to be carefully shunned, was to me a great good, to be diligently sought; and the argument which he so warmly urged, against my learning to-read, only served to inspire me with a desire and determination to learn.
